- sections 2 or 3 of the Criminal Justice (Withholding of Information on Offences against Children and Vulnerable Persons) Act 2012;
- section 9 of the Offences Against the State (Amendment) Act 1998;
- sections 8-13 of the Children First Act 2015.

The Commission will not actively record the personal details, such as names, addresses etc, of consultation participants.
